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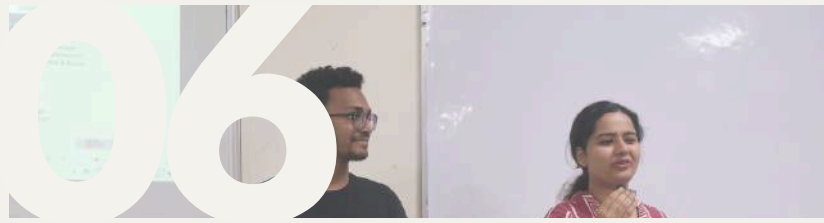
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EDITOR'S NOTE

SCIT had the privilege of hosting a thought-provoking guest lecture by Dr. Ramesh Subramaniom, Professor of Practice in Operations Management and Director of Undergraduate Research at the Naveen Jindal School of Management, University of Texas at Dallas, USA. The session was introduced by Dr. Vijay Kumar Bharati, who provided an insightful background on Dr. Subramaniom's expertise and contributions to the field.

The lecture focused on circular economies and their crucial role in fostering sustainable economic growth. Dr. Subramaniom delved into key concepts like re-manufacturing and the significance of standardization in products, citing ANSI as an essential regulatory framework. He emphasized the necessity of having standardized processes to maintain quality and efficiency in production and operations.

A highlight of the session was the discussion on Amazon's operational excellence. Dr. Subramaniom illustrated how the e-commerce giant effectively manages customer experiences, streamlines its operational workflows, and continuously innovates using data analytics. However, he also cautioned against the potential misuse of data, bringing to light ethical considerations in modern business practices.

Bridging the Gap: From Campus to Corporate

Navigating the transition from campus to the corporate world can be daunting. In his "Campus to Corporate" session, global leader Sanjeev Somani emphasized personal development and bridging the gap between academic learning and industry expectations. He highlighted core leadership values: authenticity, empathy, and vision, stressing the importance of motivating people for success.

The session revolved around three key questions: Why are we here? Where are we headed? And how do we get there? Somani urged students to embrace their "why"—their purpose and institutional choice—and appreciate the sacrifices made to reach this point. He cautioned against merely "going through the motions," emphasizing active engagement and the need to stand out in a competitive job market.

Discussing the "where," Somani explored the IT landscape, differentiating between corporate IT and consulting firms (e.g., DXC, Capgemini, Walmart, Apple). He outlined the CIO's role and their organization's key pillars: Infrastructure, Business Applications (including ERP, CRM, and BI), Information Security (CISO), and Data/BI. He used supply chain management within ERP systems to demonstrate data flow and the importance of understanding the bigger picture. He also introduced GCCs (Global Capability Centers) as another career avenue.

Addressing the "how," Somani focused on EQ (Emotional Quotient) alongside IQ. While IQ is expected at top institutions, EQ is the key differentiator. He defined high EQ characteristics: empathy, communication, positivity, networking, self-awareness, and confidence. He explained high-performing organizations, requiring high-performing individuals and leaders, fostering a positive culture. He advised against expecting immediate managerial roles, suggesting focusing on gaining experience.

Somani also addressed the impact of AI and automation, advising students to understand industry challenges before specializing in specific technologies. He concluded with the "Chief Energy Officer" concept, encouraging students to be CEOs of their own lives, owning their energy, passion, and purpose, and embracing a positive mindset, echoing Tony Robbins: "Stop being afraid of what will go wrong and start being excited about what will go right."

Empowering Minds: ML & Generative AI Workshop



The Guest Lecture Committee of DSDA (GL-DSDA) at SCIT, in collaboration with Optimum Data Analytics, organized an insightful workshop on 24th January. Optimum Data Analytics, a women-led startup founded in 2017, has made significant strides in the data analytics industry. The workshop was conducted by Abhishek Jog, Abhijeet Jagtap, Divya Dalal, and Sruthi, who shared their expertise with students. The session introduced machine learning frameworks and emphasized hands-on activities, guiding participants through data preprocessing to model evaluation. Supervised and unsupervised learning techniques were discussed, with key evaluation metrics such as MSE, RMSE, R^2 , precision, recall, and F1-score. Participants worked with regression and classification datasets to apply theoretical knowledge in practical scenarios.

Deep learning fundamentals, including kernels, activation functions, and backpropagation, were explored alongside neural network architectures like feedforward networks, CNNs for image classification, and RNNs for sequential data. Interactive tools such as TensorFlow Playground allowed participants to visualize neural networks, while hands-on exercises focused on image classification using Python and preprocessing techniques like resizing and normalization.

The workshop also covered Singular Value Decomposition (SVD) for dimensionality reduction and its applications in recommendation systems and noise filtering. A session on chatbot development using LangFlow provided practical insights into conversational AI.

Three Jupyter notebooks were shared, covering image classification with CIFAR-10, image preprocessing techniques using OpenCV, and supervised learning with SVD in predictive modeling. Additionally, the speakers provided real-time demonstrations of Generative AI and Large Language Models (LLMs), showcasing their transformative impact.

Dr. Kanchan Patil, Deputy Director at SCIT, graced the event by felicitating the speakers, acknowledging their commitment to sharing knowledge and fostering learning. She expressed gratitude for the team's efforts in making the session an enriching experience for the participants.

The workshop's focus on hands-on learning, coupled with expert guidance from the Optimum Data Analytics team, left a lasting impact on the students. It not only deepened their understanding of machine learning and AI but also inspired them to explore these fields further. The event was a resounding success, marking yet another milestone in GL-DSDA's journey of academic excellence.

Q: If you could add one completely new event or concept to Graffiti, what would it be?

A: Since Graffiti is a techno-managerial festival, I would like to include an event focusing on mock board room discussions that simulate real-world board rooms. The participants would engage in role-playing event where participants act as CEOs, investors, or stakeholders negotiating deals, mergers, or crisis management scenarios. This would not only sharpen participants' negotiation, persuasion, and decision-making skills but also give them a taste of how to deal with high pressure situations.

Q: What's the most significant challenge you faced during Graffiti, and how did you navigate it?

A: The most significant challenge during Graffiti was ensuring that the 15 events spread across two days happened smoothly. Planning the events to the t and ensuring that each and every volunteer knows the timelines helped us in overcoming this challenge. The preparation for every event a night prior really helped. In this special alumni interview, we catch up with Shivaram CV, Senior Associate at PWC and an adventurous rider, who recently embarked on a dream bike trip across western India. From the bustling streets of Bangalore to the vast white salt desert of Dholavira, this journey was more than just a road trip—it was about fulfilling a long-awaited dream, embracing the unknown, and experiencing the freedom of the open road.

Can you take us through your bike ride—where did you start, and what were some of the key stops along the way? What made your final destination so special?

I started my journey from Bangalore, making stops at Pune and Surat before heading towards my final destination—Dholavira. It's a biker's paradise, known for its breathtaking white salt desert. The route takes you through the heart of the Rann of Kutch, just about 60 kilometers from the Pakistan border. This region is home to the world's second-largest salt bed after Estonia and holds deep historical significance as part of the Harappan civilization. For any biking enthusiast, this is a dream ride.

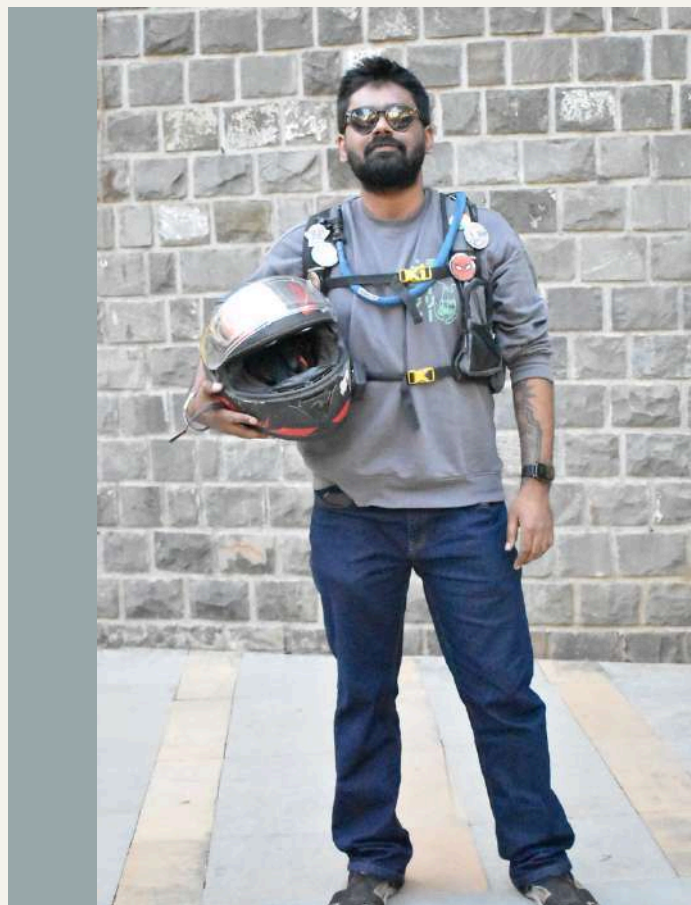
How long had you been planning for this? What was your motivation behind taking this journey?

My bike and I have been on some incredible adventures together, and this ride was no exception. It's more than just a machine—it's a true companion on the road.

I think it's my friends who made my time at SCIT truly special. We were known as the '912 gang,' named after our hostel room. Even with tools like ChatGPT, we've seen data being used for purposes that weren't intended, leading to concerns about misuse. As we're constantly feeding data into these AI systems, it's crucial to recognize that this technology can be used in many different ways, not all of them positive.

Ultimately, AI needs to be controlled and regulated to maximize its benefits. Going forward, whether we like it or not, AI is the biggest asset for humanity. It's all about how we choose to use it that will determine its impact.
